Introduction

After the summer it feels like we are due a welcome back to a fresh new season after a summer of Heatwave Public Health warnings.

I am pleased to report that NHS Coventry and Rugby CCG's Annual General Meeting held in Rugby in July 2018 was a positive event with a large attendance and engagement from a wide section of the public and stakeholders giving us an opportunity to share our annual report alongside showcasing some highlights including our Diabetes Transformation work.

July 2018 also saw a meeting of the Joint Place Forum, the coming together of Coventry and Warwickshire Health and Wellbeing Boards. This is a very positive step in positioning health and social care, along with community stakeholders in this statutory committee in a strong position to shape and influence the wider determinants of health and wellbeing across our STP footprint.

Working closer together was also on the agenda at the CCG's Governing Body Development Session in August 2018 as we looked at what the future commissioning landscape holds and how we make informed decisions about future ways of working that will best serve our local population.

The next cycle of commissioning intentions is under review and we have used population, stakeholder and membership opinion to help shape and prioritise our plans to address inequalities in health and strive to provide safe, quality, exceptional care in a changing and challenging political and financial landscape. Thanks go to all the teams involved in formulating and delivering this.

Recent media and charity reports have highlighted the rise in self harm and suicide attempts among young people nationally. Locally we are experiencing the real challenge of this problem and are working hard to address both the immediate needs it creates with our providers of children's mental health services as well as collaborating with the Council in seeking to understand and help resolve some of the wider determinants that are responsible for the escalation in self harming behaviour and mental "un-wellness" among some of the younger members of our community. This continues to be a priority for us in terms of safe delivery of service but also in investigating the wider issues the problem raises for families and society.

I have added our endorsement to the West Midland's Naloxone Ambition Document that is being spearheaded by West Midland's Police and supported by Public Health, Councils emergency services, voluntary sector and Health across our area. It has the intention that we aim to be a "leading region for the training, distribution and appropriate use of the life-saving medication naloxone".
