Public Health Update

Smart Start - 0-5 Strategy Programme

The 0-5 Strategy Group brings together representatives from health, early years' education, social care and the third sector and oversees a 3 year programme of innovative work to develop and deliver the strategy to improve the wellbeing and development of our 0-5s. This will be achieved through:

- Redesign and improving our existing services to ensure they are effective and sustainable;
- Engaging our communities to come up with innovative solutions to address the gaps in provision for 0-5s in Warwickshire;
- Integrating services for children to ensure better access and value for money.

School Nursing Service

The new School Health and Wellbeing Service has been operational since 1st November 2015. Compass, the new provider, has been working very hard to transform the service into a needs-led and outcome-focused. Service packs have been distributed to schools and meetings are being held between the allocated school nurse and the head teacher for each school to ensure schools are fully aware of the service offer and in the best position to take advantage of it. In addition, more work is being done within the service and partners to ensure local pathways are up to date. The growth assessments taken as part of the National Child Measurement Programme are almost completed and children identified as need additional support referred on to appropriate services. Annual Health Needs Assessments for Reception and Year 6 children are being carried out as part of the process to inform the development of the service children are being completed. The launch of the ChatHealth (adolescent text message service) is still on track for April 2016.

Health Visiting and Family Nurse Partnership

Approval was given by Warwickshire County Council Cabinet on Thursday 18th February 2016 to allow the County Council to extend the current contract with SWFT for a further 18 months. This is to allow a full review of the service to take place, the design of a refreshed service specification based on local needs, and the associated procurement process. The target date for the new service is 1st October 2017. The local evaluation of the FNP programme is progressing, with a target date of the final report due around the end of October 2016.

The Smart Start 'Foundation Project

This aims to use a set of engagement and asset mapping research approaches to capture information and key themes from Warwickshire's 0-5s parents, carers and communities that will help inform the Smart Start (0-5 strategy) Programme's priorities moving forward.

Public Health attended the Members Engagement meeting and Protected Learning Time session in April to feedback on the work undertaken so far and to receive comments from practice staff on emerging issues and themes

Smart Start Bids

The evaluation and approval process has been completed and 11 projects have been successful in receiving funding from the Smart Start Programme. To be successful with their bids, the projects had to demonstrate that they could deliver the priorities of the Smart Start programme by providing one or more of the following;

- Integrated Health and Social Care Services
- Good Maternal Mental Health
- Learning Activities - including speaking to your baby and reading with your child
- Enhancing Physical Activity
- Parenting Support Programmes
- High Quality Early Education

The programmes also needed to focus on areas or populations of greatest need and develop a service that could provide sustainable outcomes for families, children and workforce development. For more information on the successful bids, visit: www.warwickshire.gov.uk/smartstart .

Drugs and Alcohol Services

Healthwatch Warwickshire

An Independent review of Healthwatch Warwickshire to be carried out by Leeds Beckett University to commence in April 2016.

NHS Health Checks

Since April 13 local authorities are mandated to provide NHS Health Checks to 40-74 year olds who are eligible once every 5 years. The current programme runs until 2018. In North Warwickshire GP practices have been delivering Health Checks since April 2011(5 years). All practices need to submit their eligible population to Arden CSU by end March. Public Health will be running a publicity campaign in May to promote the uptake of NHS Health Checks. We are asking how can we support practices who are underperforming? How do we accommodate those patients who are registered with a GP practice that don't offer Health Checks?

Issues around the data used to calculate the eligible population had been raised by Warwickshire North Practices. As from April 1st Public Health have commissioned a new service provider to collect this data and will monitor the information to ensure the issue is resolved.

Coventry and Warwickshire TB Programme Board

The pilot latent TB case finding programme (through primary care and Community TB nursing service) in Coventry/Rugby now has a working timeline to start (subject to recruitment of the additional staff needed) in June 2016. This will be open to all GP surgeries to take part but aiming to capture those practices with highest incidence of TB prevalence. The programme will screen new entrants to the UK, from high risk Countries, registering with a GP.

Warm and Well

Two commissioned organisations continue to work in Coventry (Groundwork) and Warwickshire (Act on Energy) to address fuel poverty issues. This includes a Boiler on Prescription pilot assessing people with eligible medical conditions and on eligible benefits for home improvements that increase the warmth and energy efficiency of their homes. With their consent to access medical records the project can assess and evaluate the impact/improvement to health and potential savings in terms of reduced GP appts/prescriptions and wider NHS savings.

Mental Health

A reminder that Public Health Warwickshire commissions and works in partnership to develop a core set of mental health and well-being services across the County. These include:
